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EQUIPE PERFORMING ARTS SPECIAL

The Equipe Performing Arts competition challenges our students to create, develop and stage a twenty minute musical in which they are responsible for the scripting, staging, composition, design, rehearsal, organisation, promotion and performance!

The students can choose to create their own musical or retell a classic tale but they must follow a few simple rules, 1- they must involve the key arts elements of music, dance, drama and design. 2- they should find a way to incorporate students from a range of year groups and make roles available to all. 3- they should have two full musical numbers... Although supported and guided by the Heads of Equipe this is a completely student led and driven project and students have been working on their shows since September 2015. Dedicated teams of year 12 CAS students have been planning and preparing the organisation of the project from auditions to rehearsal to promotion and performance. This year has seen four fantastic contrasting shows created, which demonstrates the diversity of ideas and approaches to the brief. A tremendous amount of work has gone into every moment of these performances and every student involved is to be commended for their professional and committed approach.






BRUNEL'S MEAN GIRLS
