

Industrial action affecting schools on Wednesday 1st March 2023 As you may be aware the teaching union NEU have scheduled their next day of industrial action on Wednesday 1st March. This will be the second of three days of strike action because of a national dispute with the government over teachers' pay, and not because of any issues at

the College.

As with the first day of action we have taken the decision that the College will be closed to all students on Wednesday March 1st and so we ask that you not to send your child into school on that day. Full and weekly boarders will be supervised in the boarding houses and while flexi boarders may attend, we would prefer that they did not.

We apologise for the disruption that this may cause but after conducting a thorough risk assessment we feel this is the best way to manage the challenge of a significant number of staff being absent. Learning will be maintained for all those students who have teachers not participating in industrial action by work being set on Teams. Teaching of those lessons will not however be 'live'. Any student in Y10 to 13 whose teacher

is involved in the industrial action should undertake revision in preparation for the practice or real examinations that they will have in the next

few months. Any student due to have an instrumental music lesson on March 1st will have their lesson online at the usual time with their tutor. Please accept our apologies that you will have to make alternative arrangements for your child, but the circumstances mean that we have no other practicable option. I Wish I'd Known – a workshop for parents and carers on young people, drugs and decisions from the DSM Foundation				
We would like to invite you to a drug and alcohol awareness workshop by webinar for parents and carers delivered by drug education charity the Daniel Spargo-Mabbs Foundation. This will be held on Monday 6th March at 1900hrs - 2030hrs and led by Fiona Spargo-Mabbs and Asha Fowells.				
The world for young people is a very different place than it was for their parents, including in their vulnerability to risk from drugs and alcohol,				

and this workshop provides a great opportunity for you as a parent or carer to become more aware of what issues face your children, and what you can do to help them stay safe.

The workshop will involve finding out about: levels of young people's exposure to drugs and alcohol – what, where, when and how what young people, and their parents and carers, need to know about the risks of drugs and alcohol

factors that affect young people's decisions about drugs and alcohol, including teenage brain development how to have effective conversations with your child, and practical suggestions for what you can do to support them to stay safe

The DSM Foundation was set up by Fiona and Tim Spargo-Mabbs in 2014 after the tragic death of their 16-year-old son Daniel as a result of taking ecstasy (www.dsmfoundation.org.uk). The aim of the charity is to support young people to make safe choices about drugs, and they

House was destroyed, killing three girls: trainee teachers Evelyn Joyce Carnell (18) and Evelyn Joan Drake (19), and evacuee Edith Grace Zender (18). Joyce Carnell is buried at Ash, Kent, and I visited her gave over the half term and laid a wreath in her memory on behalf of the College. 
