

Over 40 of Hockerill's student singers and instrumentalists took part in the music tour to France and Spain in October. Our first concert included performances of impressionist repertoire at the birthplace of Claude Debussy in Paris, followed by onward travel to our Spanish partner school, I.E.S. Rosala de Castro in Santiago. Whilst in Galicia, we performed at the Conservatorio Profesional de Música de Santiago to a packed audience of Spanish exchange and music students, followed by a joint concert by Hockerill's main ensembles and traditional local songs and dances performed by Galician school students in A Estrada. Our final concert at I.E.S. Rosala was a great success, with a hugely positive response from their student audience. After Spain, we returned to France and performed a classical instrumental and choral concert in the impressive and inspiring venue of Bayonne Cathedral, finally concluding the tour with a big band set on the main stage of Disneyland's Videopolis venue in Paris. Other excursions included visits to the Guggenheim Museum in Bilbao, Biarritz Aquarium, Bayonne's Atelier du Chocolat, Santiago Cathedral and A Coruña's famous Roman Lighthouse. Many thanks to the students for their hard work and spectacular performances, as well as the additional music staff who accompanied us on this trip. We are also extremely grateful to Madame Cunin and Dr Millan for their invaluable assistance in planning, organising and translating for us on this tour - merci and gracias!





YEAR 10 SPANISH EXCHANGE TRIP TO SANTIAGO DE COMPOSTELA

During the first week of October half-term, the Spanish Department organised their Year 10 exchange trip to Santiago de Compostela. Students stayed with host families from our partner school, IES Rosalía de Castro, and had the opportunity to attend lessons and also explore the beautiful city of Santiago and some other areas of Galicia. Highlights of this trip include the visit to the cathedral roof where we braved the rain and heard about the origins of the pilgrimage route to Santiago; climbing both the Tower of Hercules in A Coruña (the only Roman lighthouse still in operation) and Siradeira Mount in O Grove; finally, the inspirational concert offered by the Hockerill Orchestra & Big Band who came to Santiago as part of their Music Tour. We all felt very proud!!!

Overall, it was a fantastic 10 day experience for all our students who were able to be immersed in Spanish culture and put their Spanish skills to the test. Students behaved impeccably and were a credit to the College. We are now

We had an excellent trip with 4 yr 12 mathematicians. We came 18th out of 24 teams so not a high score but the trip itself was excellent. The weather was dry and we absorbed lots of Cambridge culture on our way from rail station to maths venue. We went to the Sedgwick Museum of Earth Sciences which is the oldest of the University of Cambridge museums and has a collection of at least 2 million minerals and rocks, all brilliantly notated and mainly from UK locations. A walk through the museum will take you on a 4.5 billion year journey through time, from the meteoritic building blocks of planets, to the fossils of animals and plants that illustrate the evolution of life on the planet. We also went to the Whipple museum which has a fascinating collection of historic science equipment including a Newtonian telescope, orreries(models of solar system)and globes (of various planets and moons). The venue of the Challenge was the modern and very impressive Centre for Mathematical Sciences. We enjoyed the experience despite not scoring as high as we'd hoped!

Basel Trip

In November Mr Russell and Mrs Lumbers took the Year 12 DT students to Basel in Switzerland. The main focus of the trip was the Vitra Museum across the border in Germany, where the group visited the production facility, completed a design workshop and toured the campus, where each building was designed by a different worldrenowned architect.
