The event began with a drinks reception before the students and their guests, an audience of 280, moved to St Albans Hall. China Trip

Land of Dragons and Emperors

And also a country of vast proportions, contrasts and phenomenal contradictions which the 15 participants of this year's third visit to China were able to experience and enjoy first hand.

The starting point of our two leg journey was the old former capital of Xi'an which has grown and developed into a modern affluent, and by Chinese standards, middle sized city of 10 million. It is one of the oldest cities in China and the oldest of the Four Great Ancient Capitals, having held the position under several of the most important dynasties in Chinese history including Western Zhou, Qin, Western Han, Sui, and Tang. Apart from taking our first steps in getting to know this mesmerising country, its culture and people we were able to visit the beautiful Giant Wild Goose Pagoda. The pagoda is part of a Buddhist temple and was built in 652 during the Tang dynasty. Other highlights here were the Muslim street market, a food market which sells an amazing array of exotic dishes, praised loudly by the proud market people and lit by thousands of neon signs and lights! The Terracotta Army depicting the soldiers of Qin Shi Huang, the first Emperor of China is phenomenal. It is a form of funerary art buried with the emperor in 210–209 BCE and whose purpose was to protect the emperor in his afterlife. And lastly the tranquil and traditional calligraphy quarter with shop after shop selling all sorts of calligraphy equipment, art, books and antiques.

Beijing was our second leg of the journey and we travelled the 1500 kilometres by bullet train, a comfortable and fast mode of transport with the train exceeding 300 km/h for the majority of the journey.

Beijing, the massive capital city of China, has a population of more than 20 million people and a history that stretches back 3 millennia. The city epitomises in many ways the contrasts of old and new that seem to pervade the country in so many places. Giving a detailed summary of our experiences is not possible and so I will only name some of the most memorable moments of our visit here. Both the visit to the Great Wall and the Lama Temple have left lasting memories. The Great Wall overwhelms through its enormity as well as the location and on the day of our visit nature provided a spectacle of clouds, mist and sunshine for us. The Lama Temple in the centre of Beijing, surrounded by constantly congested motorways is an oasis of calm and reflection that at the same time offers the opportunity for critical reflection on the political reality in this country. The Forbidden City, former imperial palace and a walled city comprising 2000 buildings within the city, is very impressive and located adjacent to the infamous Tiananmen Square were history meets the modern Chinese police and surveillance state in all its public and hidden facets. The Temple of Heaven is yet another opening into old Chinese culture and traditions that provides space for quiet contemplation or social interaction for the people of Beijing. We came here on a rare crisp, clear and sunny day with uninhibited views over the great City.



Japan Trip October 2017

In addition to our usual varied activities in Japan, this year we were able to experience the full force of two Japanese typhoons. Despite the wet and windy weather, students gained an invaluable insight into both rural and urban parts of Japan: visiting two primary schools and spending five days with a family in the centre of Tokyo at Keio Chutobu, one of Japan's most prestigious junior high schools.



At the primary schools, our students were able to cook their own lunch and dinner with our Japanese host students; learn about traditional children's pastimes; and even have a lesson in Wadaiko, traditional Japanese drumming. They cleaned the school with the students after lunch, which all agreed was an excellent part of Japanese school life, although not all agreed that we should introduce the same system at Hockerill!

In Tokyo, students participated in the annual Tokyo urban orienteering activity, known as 'The Tokyo Challenge', and experienced modern Japanese culture from karaoke to 'Cat Cafes'.

The students were a great credit to the school and firm friendships were established, which I am sure will continue into the future.

Year 7 and Year 12 students have risen to the challenge of starting life in a new school or, at least, a new part of it. Year 7 students have successfully found their way around the buildings to all their new classes and their first report in January will confirm the progress they have made, adding to the information parents and students received at the Consultation Meeting in October. Year 12 students have had their first report and Parents' Evening and have proved to be a very hard-working Year group. Their efforts were rewarded with a Cake Break in early December when Mr Markham congratulated the students on their hard work so far.

Year 13 students underwent a gruelling but rewarding series of IBDP Mock Examinations in November. More intense in terms of schedule than the real examinations in April and May, the students were given as realistic an experience as possible with invigilation expertly carried out by Mrs Wright's band of examination gurus. Our thanks go to Mrs Wright, our Examinations Officer and her deputy, Mrs Trimble, for organising these exams so superbly. Mrs Wright commented that this was one of the best-behaved year groups she had come across in her long career; this is a great testament, not just to the students, but also Mr Clark and the Year 13 tutors. The Year 11 GCSE mocks will take place after Christmas and we expect the Year 11s to find time for a carefully planned and executed revision programme over the festive season.

The Year 13s have also been sending off applications to universities both at home and abroad, with many of the earlier applicants having already received excellent offers from the universities of their choice. Oxbridge applicants have been visiting their Colleges for interviews and they hope for good news in early January. Thanks go to Mr Snell and the team of tutors for all the excellent work they do on helping the students with their applications. We wish all the applicants the very best of luck.

Mr Whiteley is Head of Lower College and is very pleased with the way the Lower College students are maturing; he works very closely with Ms Humphris and Miss Rowan to create an excellent atmosphere in the Lower College classrooms. The Lower College students have been working hard to develop the IB Learner Profile attributes. Challenged by their teachers to understand the 'big ideas', they investigate and develop skills, knowledge and understanding. The IB Enrichment Day in October was a highlight of the term and allowed students to gain a little more understanding of what it means to be a global citizen.

The youngest examination cohort is the Year 10 group, headed up by Mrs Whiteley who has taken over from Signor Soriano-Vidal who is now working back in his homeland. As you all know, Mrs Whiteley expects the very best from her students and she is very keen that her new charges will emulate the success of last year's Year 11 and 13 students who recently helped Hockerill to top place in the recent Sunday Times Parent Power rankings for state comprehensive schools. This is an accolade we are all very proud of here and is a really impressive reward for the work of the staff and students. Amnesty International's Write for Rights

On Friday the 1st of December, members of Hockerill Anglo European College gathered in the Humanities department to share the spirit of Christmas through Amnesty's Write for Rights campaign, organised by the Amnesty International group and the Human Rights Club. The students wrote Christmas cards and words of comfort to people from around the world whose basic rights had been violated. It is based on the idea that a few words of support to someone who is struggling can help them immeasurably in the holiday season. This year, the campaign was focusing on ten different cases from Chad to China. They include people such as Hanan, an Egyptian woman who last saw her husband injured on the news, after protesting in 2010. Her husband is one of the many people who have 'disappeared' at the hands of the Egyptian Security Forces. However Hanan did not stop looking for her husband. She looked so much that she was arrested and accused of being part of a 'banned group'. Write for Rights allow people to give their support to people like Hanan who have been wrongly imprisoned, as well as push governments for their release. The turnout for Hockerill's part in the world's biggest human rights movement was the largest we've seen since we started taking part. With help from Mrs Rittman and Mrs Garland, many sixth formers and other College members took time out of their day to try and help people less fortunate than themselves; an ideal that Hockerill encourages their students to have and carry with them through life. Hockerill members sent only a few of the near 700,000 emails, letters and petitions sent out to people this year. Those 700,000 different documents can give someone the hope they need this Christmas time or nudge the authorities that little bit more to do the right thing. We look forward to next term when we continue Amnesty's good work. New members are always welcome to Amnesty (Y12-13) and Human Rights Club (Y7-11).

PE Update:

Continued Golfing Success for Yr 10's Max

Max flew to Portugal on 6th November along with the other 11 Boy and 9 Girl Finalists to play in the final of the Telegraph Vitality Junior Championship 2017. Max was the voungest finalist in a group including 6 England Internationals and in which all other boys were aged 16-18. The competition is the largest and most prestigious junior competition in the UK with over 21,000 players competing in qualifying events and the 9 boys with the lowest Gross scores in qualifying competitions go through to the final played on Quinta Do Lago North Course, it's home



for the last 5 of its 34 year history, to play in a 54 hole final. Max qualified by shooting a 5 under par 66 at Berkhamsted en route to winning the Hertfordshire Boys U18 County Championships in July.

The event not only involved 3 rounds of competition but included seminars and fun events, such as an evening with former Ryder Cup Captain Paul McGinley on how to make it in the professional ranks. It also started with an 'Am:Am' event where the players played with sponsors and this also served as a practice round. The course was set up as for a professional event with very fast greens and tough pin positions and a first round 71 (1 under) put him 2 shots off the pace. In Round 2 Max shot a best of the day Level Par 72, including a closing Eagle 3, in windy conditions and moved to joint leader. In the final round composure beyond his years led to him having a 5 shot lead with 6 holes remaining and his eventual 71 saw him winning by 3 shots to become the youngest winner ever in the history of the competition and the only boy to break Par in the event. He joins an illustrious list of winners including current World Numbers 6 and 29, Justin Rose and Matthew Fitzpatrick, and the win has seen him on Sky Sports in a highlights programme that will be repeated over the Christmas break.

Max flew to the UAE 3 weeks later to play in the Faldo Series Grand Final, hosted by Sir Nick Faldo, at the Al Ain Resort. The field consists of winners of qualifying events from around the world in 3 age groups, Under 21, Under 18 and Under 16 and was again over 54 holes. He did not have much time to recover after the long flight before the first round and a 'tired/ jet lagged' back nine saw him finish with a 75. Determined to not let this get the better of him he shot a 4 under par 66 in Round 2, and a final round 74 put him 3rd in the Under 16 age group and in the top 15 overall — another big achievement.

These 2 competitions are a fitting conclusion to a great golfing year that has culminated in his selection for the full England U18 Boys Squad for 2018 and a handicap of Plus 1.

British Shooting UK – South East Schools Pistol Championships

Last month, Estelle Pierrejean 9B, travelled to Bookham Rifle Club in Surrey to compete in the first ever South East Schools Pistol Championships against 110 other competitors. The Hockerill student has competed in Modern Pentathlon before and still regularly participates in Pony Club Tetrathlon and Triathlon events which have been derived from the same Olympic sport and includes the element of pistol shooting.



However this was her first attempt at a pure shooting competition and she did not quite know what to expect. It was quickly apparent that she was the only competitor there using a single stroke pneumatic gun — her trusted Italian FAS 6004 with which she practices against in all weather conditions in the back garden! Her other counterparts were using PCP (Pre-charged pneumatic) or C02 guns which are considered to be lighter and more accurate yet far more expensive.

Estelle had to shoot one-handed for 4 rounds of 5 shots from 10 metres at a target in a purpose built shooting range. It was a very different style of shooting to what she is used to as in Tetrathlon communication is forbidden and it is a very quiet and disciplined setting. Yet in this competition, after a 5 minute practice session, the spectators at the Rifle Club were allowed and encouraged to enthusiastically cheer on the shooters. The scores were also electronically shown after each round for everyone to see, including the competitors, which helped to contribute to a very vibrant and tense atmosphere. Estelle was shooting in the last detail of her age group (Intermediate for Yr. 9-10) and the scoring system had ranked all the previous shooters adding to mount up the pressure.

After her first round, Estelle was in 32nd spot but she maintained her nerve and had a good 2nd round of 35 points to pull up to 26th position. Her 3rd target saw a little dip in her score but that seemed to be evident across all of the shooters as she still surprisingly climbed the rankings to 18th spot before her last round. Estelle managed to keep her cool with another fine score of 35 in the final round to boost her final position to 10th place. The first four shooters qualified for the Nationals so Estelle has her sights firmly on this for next year.

Young Enterprise

The two Young Enterprise teams have had a very successful year so far. I am impressed that both teams have manufactured their own products and were ready for market by the beginning of December having only started the process in September.

Gentium are led by Jasmine Blackham, with support from Mr Whiteley and their Young Enterprise business advisor Gladys Fleet. They won three awards at the Ware Dickensian Fayre; best team, best Corporate Social Responsibility and the award for Innovation. They sold out

of their products at the Ware Fayre and the Hockerill Christmas Fair and have made over £400 across the two events.

Aggregate&Co are led by Ella Pickering, with support from Ms Perrone and their Young Enterprise business advisor Martin Budzinski. They won two awards at the Ware Dickensian Fayre; runner up in the team competition and best trade stand. They also sold out of their products and have sold over £400 of products over the two trade fairs so far.

This has been our most successful year to date after five years partnership with Young Enterprise. In the Lent Term teams will attend the Welywn Trade Fair and also the Young Enterprise Showcase at County Hall where both teams will have to prepare a presentation and a business plan to judges from the local area.

All the students involved have found this to be a rewarding experience in which they develop a range of transferable skills for the world of work. 
