Year 9 Community Project

All students in the final year of the MYP are expected to complete an assessed project that gives them the chance to display their ability to research, plan and reflect. The project also provides an opportunity for students to think beyond the curriculum and to apply their skills in an unfamiliar area. For Hockerill students who complete the MYP in Year 9, the expectation is that they will complete a Community Project.

This focuses on community and service, encouraging students to explore how to implement service as action in their community. The Community Project gives students an opportunity to develop awareness of the needs in various communities, and to address a specific need which they feel concerned about.

We launched the Community project with year 9 students on the first Enrichment Day on 11 October. All students worked in groups to identify an environmental issue that they would like to become involved with. Some

students are basing their work at the College whilst others are going to be taking action in the local community.

All students worked independently and collaboratively and we were really proud of their approaches to this learning. The day culminated in a display of the action planning posters each group had produced with all students giving feedback on how the projects could be improved further.

Since the Enrichment Day the students have set up their Process Journals, an integral part of the project and have met to discuss next steps. The students will have more reflection sessions in order to prepare for the next Enrichment Day on 1 March where they will be looking to further develop their projects. We hope to present the final projects to parents and the local community in June.

Go Green Hockerill continues to play a key role in the College's drive to constantly evaluate the environmental impact of the choices we make as a community.

One of our priorities this term has been to ensure the classroom paper recycling system is fully functional. We have raised money to replace broken or missing recycling bins in each classroom and re-appointed form eco-captains, who are in charge of ensuring the bins are used properly and emptied regularly. We have also begun recycling the many board pens, biros and highlighters used in the classrooms, with bins now available in the sixth form centre, staffroom and library.

We were excited to learn that the Year 9 service projects would be related to environmental issues this year and were happy to contribute a raft of ideas, from increasing the number of butterfly-friendly plants on the site to creating artworks out of used plastic bottles.

The club has also continued its investigation of levels of air pollution around the school and encouraged students to consider a 'reduced plastics' Secret Santa. In our weekly meetings, we have had some lively discussions on a wide range of issues, such as the varied impacts of different diets including vegetarianism, veganism and reduced meat consumption.

After Christmas, we plan to investigate the possibility of installing our own DIY wind turbine, research the desirability and feasibility of more outdoor recycling bins and prepare for College assemblies in late March.

In memoriam: Jo Barker

Jo was an outstanding teacher; her overriding aim in teaching was to share her passion for literature with her students, helping them to fall in love with the subject. Jo's lessons — whether writing poetry on bananas or analysing the lyrics to Wham's Last Christmas were certainly fun, but lessons were so much more than that. Jo fundamentally believed that all students deserved a chance to engage with the best of world



literature at the highest academic level. Through her choice of books and poetry, negotiated with her students each year, Jo explored the most complex and difficult themes with her class, relating them to the lives of her students and the wider world. Studying literature with Jo became a way for students to see the world from different perspectives, identify injustice and understand something of the power of literature to not only describe the world as it is but to show how it can be made better. In doing so, she inspired a generation of Hockerill students.

Beyond her subject, Jo firmly believed that a teacher's primary responsibility is to care for their students and to encourage them not just to be themselves, but to be the best version of themselves. Jo was a fierce defender of her students. Always able to see the best in them, Jo would speak up on their behalf and ensure their point of view was heard — and understood. In her pastoral role in Roding Boarding House and as a form tutor she provided exceptional support for those in her care. This often extended beyond the end of their time at Hockerill; Jo kept in touch and continued to mentor students throughout university and beyond. This was particularly the case with those whom she had supported through their applications to university. As the College's Oxbridge co-ordinator Jo was instrumental in raising the profile of Oxford and Cambridge amongst the sixth-form and introduced a comprehensive programme to support candidates applying to these universities. She would have been proud of the record number of students who interviewed this year.

Jo was a passionate individual and fought hard to advance the causes she believed in. A determined campaigner for the rights of women, she raised the profile of International Women's Day each year. Organising the distribution of yellow mimosa flowers from our international students to all female staff, teaching and non-teaching, was just one of the many ways Jo reminded the College community that women's rights mattered. She was also a strong advocate for LGBTQ+ rights in College, internationalism, recycling and environmental stewardship, Cornish independence, and disabled rights. Fittingly, Jo appeared in the audience of Question Time less than a week before she died arguing that a People's Vote on Brexit was needed to give young people a chance to have their say on the future of their country.

As a teacher, colleague and friend, Jo will be profoundly missed; however, her example on how to live a rich and meaningful life ensures a legacy that will endure.

On Thursday 18th October 20 Geography and Science GCSE students departed for the inaugural trip to Iceland. The early hour did not dampen their enthusiasm and before we knew it we had been transported to the incredible island of Iceland. We were welcomed at the airport by Frodo, who was to be our coach driver for the duration. We managed to visit the 'Bridge between the continents', Gunnuhver Hot Springs and mud puddles all before lunch. It was evident to all students and Mrs Hodder why Iceland is the best location in the world to see these natural geophysical features and it was fantastic to see how keen the students were, despite the driving rain and arctic winds! They also realised that the Icelanders are a really fascinating population. Where else in the world would you find a museum and earthquake simulator in a shopping centre?! Icelanders are also very proud of the fact that their country is unique and as a consequence we visited some amazing interactive museums which taught our students about plate tectonics in the most fun and informative ways. Our accommodation was amazing; groups of 4 to 6 friends shared a bungalow in the Icelandic countryside. Icelanders have big appetites so we never went hungry and ate like Vikings, and even dressed up like them one evening. I never knew year 11 girls could be so scary! Despite it being so very cold and wet, the students never complained. This may be because they read my packing list carefully and rarely took off their waterproof clothes or perhaps they were inadvertently enjoying the geothermal heat that all Icelanders do for a fraction of the cost of our expensive heating. This was put to the test in Laugardaslaug swimming pool in Rekyjavik where the students frolicked in geothermally heated pools, slides and hot tubs (some of them even going under in the ice-tub!) A theme of sustainability was becoming evident to our group of geo-scientists who enjoyed a steaming hot bowl of tomato and basil soup grown in greenhouses lit and warmed by geothermal heat once more and an ice cream made in a dairy where you can observe the cows who provided the cream. After a zero air miles snack, we travelled to Gulfoss waterfalls. Once again, we got soaked but our spirits were not dampened, as the falls were spectacular. Our happy band were now tiring after 4 days of non-stop geo-fun. Nothing would prepare them for our last day, which for me was the highlight of an amazing few days. We walked to the snout of the Solheimajökull glacier, which was blackened, from ash

from the Eyjafjallajokull volcanic eruption. It was beautiful, yet gave a stark warning to those who do not believe global warming is credible. To finish off our tour we visited Reynishverfi beach, black volcanic sand surrounded by the most perfect basaltic column cliffs. Iceland casts a spell on its visitors, whether you are interested in its physical features or wish to experience the world's most northerly capital city and the charms of its friendly inhabitants (who thankfully all speak perfect English!). All of our students made the most of this amazing experience and were a pleasure to be with for the duration of the trip. Thank you to you all and Mrs Hodder for making it so memorable. Japan Trip/Exchange 2018

On Friday 19th October, a group of 14 students, accompanied by Mrs Rajakumar and Ms Davids, departed from Hockerill and set out on a trip to Japan - a trip which would prove to be one of new experiences, education and immersion into the Japanese society.

After arriving in Japan, we travelled across the country to Nagano, a smaller, more rural city than Tokyo, which is home to the famous Zenkoji Temple. We stayed in a Buddhist Monastery for four nights, and over the course of our days in Nagano, took part in various activities, such as travelling to the Togakushi Ninja Museum and shrine, and visiting the stunning Matsumoto Castle, one of the last of its type remaining in Japan.

We also visited our partner primary schools - Komaki and Wakatsuki - for three days, interacting with all of the students and participating in traditional Japanese activities such as Japanese-style drumming, origami and dancing, in addition to just generally experiencing this completely different schooling system.

Following our final day at the primary schools, we then travelled back to Keio School in Tokyo to meet with our extremely welcoming exchange partners, who had visited us at Hockerill in March, and their families. We spent 2 full days at school with our partners, again experiencing this completely different system and culture, taking part in a whole range of classes at school - ranging from music to studies of Japanese society.

The weekend was spent in our host families, who were all incredibly generous, showing us around different parts of Tokyo and helping us understand new aspects of Japanese culture and society. Not only was our time with our exchange families fun and exciting, but we all felt that it helped us improve and experiment with our Japanese language much more, and despite being difficult at time, was a very beneficial experience.

Finally, after saying goodbye to our host families, we spent our final day in Tokyo participating in the Tokyo Challenge - an urban-orienteering activity in which travelled around the city by train in small groups, visiting the different districts in Tokyo and spending time in a huge range of areas - from Buddhist temples such as the beautiful Sensouji Temple, to Harajuku, the fashion district of Tokyo.

Overall, the entire trip was a truly fantastic experience, during which we learnt to understand the Japanese way of thinking, visit many of the country's wonders, and of course, improve our language skills drastically.







Berlin Trip

ESSA Cross Country


A number of Hockerill students attended the ESSA cross country competition back in October. A junior boys and junior girls team worked hard against some tough competitions in St Albans.
