Message from the Acting Headteacher

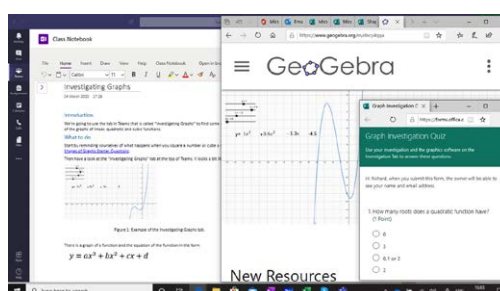

Of particular note we are once again delighted at the number of students who have been offered conditional places to study at Oxford and Cambridge Universities.

The Year 11 Food Preparation and Nutrition class enjoyed an exciting morning's trip to the local Gü factory, on the Rainham Road Industrial Estate in Bishop's Stortford, during our recent IB day. Removing all jewellery, outdoor wear, leaving phones behind and thorough hand cleaning was a good introduction to the world of work and highlighted measures taken by Gü to minimise contamination. After an initial health and safety briefing we were introduced to Fred Ponnay who is the head chef and has the enviable task of new product development within Gü. He talked to us about how to design a new product and focussed on simplicity linked with giving a twist to something already familiar to consumers. Tasting Indonesian sugar was a new experience for us all and the tale of importing and issues with customs brought to life the struggles that companies may face when sourcing raw ingredients. Then on to the factory tour. We were shown round all areas of the factory whilst wearing PPE which comprised of a dashing white overall, shoes and ear plugs all topped off with a red hairnet. The company were producing their famous Lemon Cheesecake and as well as delicious aromas we had first hand experience of all the stringent health and safety regulations as well as quality checks when we were guided through the production line. At the end of the visit we were presented with individual Gü chill bags, each filled with a range of different Gü products as well as a large box of a variety of ingredients that are used to make Gü desserts. This was a very generous gift from the company and was highly appreciated by all. I can fully understand why the students were voting it as 'best trip ever'! The chatter on the way back to College was non stop and it was clear that the students were ready for their own Gü making experience. In the afternoon the students worked in our Food Technology room in teams of 2 to create their own Gü style products such as Lemon and Blueberry Cheesecake and Salted Caramel Millionaires Cheesecake. The three Cadets from Hockerill College CCF; Cpl David Bintley, Cpl Oliver Cashman and Cpl Toby McCrae all passed the course with two receiving Highly Competent passes and received their SCIC badge on their return to college. This is an incredible achievement by the cadets.

RAF Gliding

On Sunday March 8th, two cadets from Hockerill College CCF, Cpl Grose and LCpl González-Upadhyay attended a gliding course at RAF Syerston near Newark, organised by 644 Voluntary Gliding Squadron. The morning was spent completing ground training and revision, this included the principles of basic airmanship. The afternoon was spent on the runway and cadets took turns to have two launches each in an Air Cadet Vigilant glider. Once in the air cadets spent some time flying a circuit of the airfield, practicing level flight, turning and diving, before lining up the aircraft ready for the instructor to land it.

The day culminated with both cadets being awarded their blue gliding wings which is an outstanding achievement, the first Hockerill cadets to have achieved gliding wings for several years.

Range & Obstacle Course

On Saturday 29th February Hockerill CCF attended a Range day at Merville Barracks in Colchester. Twenty-eight cadets were given the opportunity to conduct live firing using the SA80 A2 assault rifle. For the first part of the day the conditions were terrible with howling winds and horizontal rain, however in true form this did not deter the cadets or staff who demonstrated their resilience. Training was delivered by four members of staff from Hockerill CCF as well as two regular soldiers. For many of the cadets this was an incredible achievement bearing in mind the short time some of the cadets have been part of the CCF. The shooting overall was good with every cadet achieved their basic shooting qualification. The cadets were also given the opportunity to practice and learn new skills running over an obstacle course used by regular soldiers. The cadets, once again, showed their resilience with many putting their fears of heights to one side and tackling over twenty-five different obstacles. Lastly the cadets were shown many different types of weapons by Sgt Kilbride a member of the Cadet Training Support Team with an affiliation to Hockerill CCF. The day was a great success because of the combined effort of staff and cadets.



Hockerill pupil's language skills win national Mandarin competition

Congratulations to Year 12's Gayathri Gajeevan who won first prize at the final of the British Council Mandarin Speaking competition in London. Now in its seventeenth year, the Mandarin Speaking Competition is organised by the British Council and aims to build interest in Chinese language and culture. Pupils from 43 UK secondary schools participated in the final round at the Victory Services Club.

The competition, which took place on 5 February, was attended by the Schools Standards Minister Nick Gibb, the Chief Executive of the British Council Sir Ciarán Devane and representatives of the Chinese Embassy: Xia Jianhui, Minister Counsellor of Education and Li Guoqiang, First Secretary.

Pupils competed in either the Individual Language Ability or Group Performance section. Gaya won the Advanced Group category, giving a two-minute speech in Mandarin and answering some additional questions in the language in Mandarin on the topic of environmental issue.

Sir Ciaran Devane, Chief Executive of the British Council, said: "Gayathri impressed the judging panels in regional heats and now the final with her skilled Mandarin speaking ability. The winner's prize of a trip to China is testament to the huge amount of effort they put in."

"Language learning is an essential part of understanding and collaborating with other countries and cultures. With more than one billion Mandarin speakers in the world, it's important that more young people in the UK learn the language – those that do will find it opens up exciting study and work opportunities in our increasingly interconnected world."

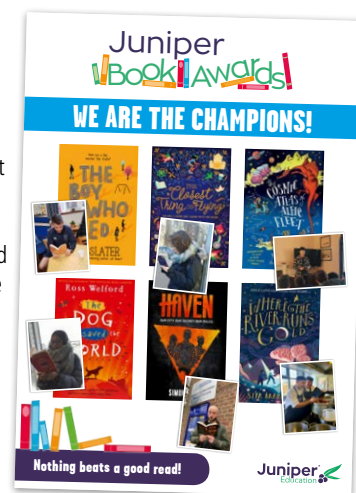

Project Josie

Project Josie started when I was in year 10; we had been given the brief for our DT coursework which was to design a product for developing countries. I chose to focus on human trafficking.

The idea was inspired by #AskForAngela and the Metal Spoon Campaign. #AskForAngela, started in 2016, is used in bars and pubs across the UK to help save people from sexual assault by asking a bartender for "Angela"; the bartender can then call a taxi or help the person make a discreet exit. The idea behind the metal spoon campaign was to put a metal spoon in your underwear if you are in an airport and are a victim of human trafficking, FGM, forced marriage, or any other dangerous situation. When the user goes through the metal detectors in security the detectors will go off and because the spoon is in the underwear which is a sensitive area, the user gets taken away to be searched privately, at which point they can ask for help. However, there are many problems with the metal spoon campaign as it is unhygienic, and the user might not be able to get a hold of a metal spoon. So, I combined these products, I took the poster idea from #AskForAngela and the metal detectors/metal object idea from the metal spoon campaign.

Project Josie consists of a small dispenser that holds about 7 concave discs and poster with the phrase "are you in danger" in many different languages. The dispenser sits next to a toilet roll dispenser in the airport toilets before security and the poster is hung on the back of the toilet cubicle door. The idea is that a person can go to the toilet, see the poster and put the disc in their waistband or pocket and then go through airport security and be identified as a victim of human trafficking. It can also be used by victims of FGM or forced marriage etc.

Nearing the end of my coursework I needed to test my product, I emailed many airports in the UK asking if I could test it and Essex Police at Stansted Airport replied; they offered for me to join them for the day to test my product. They really liked the product and since then they have been very supportive and have tried to help the project progress. They have introduced me to a charity, and I have spoken at a training day. Recently, as a result of My Freedom Day organised by CNN my friend, Maddy Miles, and I made a video documenting Project Josie which we hope will spread the word about Project Josie. From the Joint Chairs of Governors

The last few weeks have made us question our lives and think about what is really important to us.

As a school those thoughts have centred round the well-being of our students, staff and the wider Hockerill community. Through the highs and lows of the last few weeks the key things that have shone through are the strength of community on which Hockerill is built and how positively everyone has responded to the daily challenges thrown at them.

This can be demonstrated in so many ways but here are a few highlights we'd like to share with you:

The speed and professionalism of all staff in the way they have adapted and delivered teaching to an online and virtual environment and how this is supporting students through this difficult time;

The staff actions in monitoring the potential impacts of Coronavirus and keeping everyone informed as the situation progressed in uncertain times;

The maturity with which students have adapted their routines and how they are supporting each other with this new way of learning;

The action needed to keep the school open for those pupils that need to be there – supporting key workers and boarders unable to return home;

The initiatives being thought up by students and staff to help the NHS and wider community – including a donation of our science personal protective equipment and cleaning products to the NHS;

The appointment of our new Principal David Woods – using video technology the selection panels interviewed all candidates remotely during the final stages of the recruitment process – enabling us to keep to our original timeline; and

The dedication and commitment from the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) and all of Hockerill's staff ensuring that the well-being of our students is the number one priority.

The Board of Governors are in daily contact with each other and the SLT monitoring the situation and will continue to do so over the holidays.
