## > NEWS

Welcome back to the Lent Term and Happy New Year. 2021 may not be starting quite as we expected but at least we are in territory that is familiar to us. Remote

learning is not the same as face-to-face learning but our experience in the first lockdown was positive and we are confident that we can keep students on track. There are still a number of things that we do not yet have full clarity on e.g. what exactly will be required for the GCSE grades to be awarded, and so the key message at this point for students in all year groups is to keep studying as if nothing has changed. As and when we have further information we will respond accordingly.

### **Online Learning**

Following the government announcement about school closure, we adapted our Inset day programme so that teachers and support staff had time to prepare for another period of online learning. During the first lockdown teachers at Hockerill provided excellent lessons using Teams. This was recognised by many of you and enabled most of our students to stay up with their studies making the return to College in September easier for all. During the Michaelmas Term we have retained the use of Teams as a teaching and learning platform and this will make moving back to online learning much easier for everyone. We have continued to have training with the use of Teams and have worked towards a more consistent use across subject areas. This will all contribute towards high quality teaching and learning, and we very much intend to continue to support students fully with their learning so that they do not get behind with their studies. This week we have written to Year 11 and Year 13 students to reassure them that we will continue to support them and keep them informed

of changes to the way they are assessed and graded for their GCSEs and IBDP subjects. We are awaiting further guidance from Ofqual and the DfE on how GCSEs will be assessed. The IB have already made changes to courses for Year 13 students but we are expecting further communication from them in the light of the current situation. We will keep parents and students informed at every stage. In the interim, the expectation is that students will continue with their courses as normal. Students in all year groups can expect to receive clear instructions for all their lessons. Most lessons will have a live element where the teacher

will explain the work and outline expectations for activities and work to be completed. This will vary depending on the nature of the lesson and the level of independent work the students need to complete. Where possible, the teacher will be online to assist students who have questions when completing independent work. We are also exploring ways of supporting individuals and groups of students using some of the new features on Teams. Students can expect the following. All home learning will be facilitated through Microsoft TEAMs.

- All online resources will be well-organised and easy for students to access.
- Expectations for remote teaching will be that lessons for Years 10 and above should be live for at least part of the lesson, preferably for
- most or all of the lesson, but this will depend on the nature of the particular lesson. In Years 7 to 9 lessons should be 'live' whenever possible but where that is not possible teachers must have live contact with all students in their classes at least once per week.
- Increasing data allowances to support disadvantaged children

The government has announced a scheme where the data allowances on mobile devices can be increased for disadvantaged children to

### Check your child/children can log on to Microsoft Teams and can access the work set. Ensure your child/children is available to complete the work at the time of their timetabled lesson. If this is not possible due to time zone

- difference etc., please establish a school day routine in line with your own time zone. Please ensure that the College is aware that your
- child/children will not be available for live lessons due to time zone issues. Advise your child/children that classroom teachers will aim to be available at the timetabled lesson time for all Year 10, 11, 12 and 13 classes. Where possible, teachers will aim to be present for lessons for other year groups and will ensure that there is live contact at least
- once a week. Lessons will be set on TEAMS and the expectations made clear in all cases. Provide students with a quiet and suitable space to work, where possible, without distraction, so they are able to benefit from the lesson and continue to learn.
- Ensure your child/children are not present in public spaces during school hours, apart from those which will benefit their learning and provide internet access if required, such as public libraries.
- Children must follow all COVID guidelines set out by the government that relate to the Tier that the home area falls under. All students will be able to contact their classroom teachers through Teams or via email if there is a need to do so. Each Head of Year has also created a Team so they are able to disseminate information quickly and effectively.

Parents are able to contact their child's Head of Year by email. The Year group email (year7@hockerill.com and so on) will still be active and

monitored regularly. Please read through the expectations for students carefully, discuss these with your child/children and support the College in ensuring they

## Remote Learning Provision at Hockerill

If your child at Hockerill is struggling to access lessons while in lockdown due to lack of a suitable device because of financial difficulties, please contact Christian Appleford via admin@hockerill.com as the school may be able to loan a device for the short term.

Students will follow their timetable lesson by lesson and will therefore complete College work each day that the College would normally be open

- Students may be expected to submit completed work to their teacher work would be uploaded to Teams or submitted through email. Students will be given a deadline for submission of work and this deadline should be met
- Students must not use personal email addresses or social media accounts to keep in touch with staff— all students must use their hockerill. com email address
- Attendance will be monitored, and attendance issues will be addressed **Live Classes on Teams**
- Students must wear suitable clothing, as should anyone else in the household Any computers used should be in appropriate areas, for example, not in bedrooms; and where possible be against a neutral background

- Behaviour must be appropriate (in line with College rules). The same behaviour expectations as at College will apply when being taught remotely
- **Teachers** As far as possible teachers will maintain College working hours. During these hours they will read and respond to emails, plan resources
- and provide feedback as well as remotely teach lessons Teachers should make every attempt to be contactable for the lesson times of Years 10, 11, 12 and 13. They will, as much as is possible, try to present live lessons for other year groups. When this is not possible, lesson expectations will be clear.




